- **Approval of Agenda:** Director Castro made a motion to approve the agenda, seconded by Director Hollister. All voted in favor, zero (0) opposed and motion passes.
- **Approval of May 2024 Meeting Minutes:** Director Castro made a motion to approve the May 23, 2024 meeting minutes, seconded by Vice-Chairman Carrara. All voted in favor, zero (0) opposed and motion passes.

- **Recruitment:** Chief Engineer as an open announcement and Environmental Inspector Supervisor as Departmental in progress – current status: Cleared BBMR on August 5th, then DOA Classification, routed to DOA Recruitment as of August 15th.
- **Certified Packets:** EHS I (Preferential hire x2), Chemist I, (Preferential hire x1)
 - o Both in-house employees accepted the EHS I positions



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- **Pending:** Certified candidate list for additional EHS I (x3), Chemist (x1), and Environmental Tech (x1) from DOA
- **Resignations:**
 - One EHS I from EMAS resignation effective July 19th.
 - Air & Land Programs Administrator resignation effective July 26th.
- As of 08/09/2024, there were 51 FTEs (Full-Time Equivalent)
- **US EPA Region 9 Program Manager & Environmental Justice Visit- June 8 – 14.**
 - Visit focused on an introduction of environmental justice (EJ) and key Region 9 partners
 - Agency facilitated meetings with potential community stakeholders and non-governmental and educational organizations who could avail of EJ grants
 - EPA Environmental Justice Coordinators provided the agency with an orientation on the principles of EJ, community grants and government to government grants.
- **CAPT. Elizabeth DeGrange:** Reported for duty to the Agency on July 3, 2024 as the Agency's Senior Science Advisor with responsibilities that include:
 - Serves as a senior science advisor and subject matter expert to the Administrator to guide capacity development initiatives, environmental policy decisions, program development, grant management and organizational structure.
 - Provides technical assistance to the agency managers and staff for the development and management of programs that involve both unregulated emerging contaminants and regulated contaminants in drinking water, ground water, surface water, air, soil and other media.
 - As directed by the Administrator, temporarily fill key program management vacancies to implement program activities and supervise program staff, and train and mentor new program managers after they are hired.
 - Oversees the implementation of relevant portions of the agency's Emerging Contaminants in Small and Disadvantaged Communities (EC-SDC) Grant program, to include (but not limited to) the development of laboratory and staff technical and managerial capacity, and the development of agency-wide strategies and programs to protect public health as it relates to emerging contaminants and other environment risks that may be identified.

Budget/Procurement:

- Agency was selected for a FY 2-24 Exchange Network grant award valued at \$130K.
 - Notice of award pending
 - Funds will cover the cost of enhancing the WALTERS system
- **FEMA reimbursement:** CAT B Emergency Protective Measure has been obligated on June 24th in the amount of \$243,687.13 for force account labor overtime, equipment, materials and contracts agency facility repair and the management of the Typhoon Mawar temporary disaster debris management sites. **UPDATE:** Connie advised she received the email this morning with the Notice to proceed to start the reimbursement of Guam EPA expenditures.
- **GALC arrears for operations building leave:** GEDA accountants in communication with DOA accountant's to reconcile paid invoices – GEDA and GEPA continue to work towards settling the dispute in payment history and arrears. **UPDATE:** Connie advised Ms. Mary Grace from DOA contacted her this week and is working closely with GEDA and Guam EPA to resolve the issue. Director Castro inquired on how much longer this take will because we have been addressing this for a few months. Connie advised, DOA has been pulled in to assist with the accounting issue. DOA is working with both GEDA & GEPA to help reconcile the account and provide us a definite figure on what GEPA owes. Director Hollister asked if we are sure that we owe in which Administrator Lastimoza and Connie Afilleje advised we do owe but not the amount that is being requested for.



Agency Headquarters:

- **UPDATE:** Architect and engineering RFP bids were submitted to DPW on August 6.
- US EPA commits to additional \$8.4M to continue site cleanup which expected to start on November 2024

POLICY:

UPDATE: Bill 249-37: Authorizing Guam EPA and the Guam Coastal Management Program to hire Environmental Law Attorneys – Bill was placed on June Session Agenda after being referred back to committee during April Session

- Agency supported measure and urged its passage
- Bill amends the Guam Environmental Protection Agency Act codified in 10 GCA Chapter 45 by adding a section to authorize the agency to hire a classified attorney for its exclusive use with use of federal funds
- Agency provided information to the legislature which detailed the benefits of having legal counsel to provide guidance on NOVs, rulemaking, interpreting statutes, open government and procurement through RFPs and contracts
- Still in committee

Bill 283-37LS: Relative to the inspection of imported water bottles – Introduced April 25. Public Hearing held on July 15.

- Bill proposes that bottled water produced outside of the US will be prohibited from importation for sale on Guam prior to DPHSS performing inspections and verifying that the imported bottled water has been tested and certified with standards in accordance with the Act.
- Bill also authorizes and mandates the DPHSS director to promulgate and enforce rules and regulations and standards for imported bottled water produced outside of the US with the advice of Guam EPA within six months of the proposal's enactment
- Provision in the bill requires importers of bottled water to have it tested in accordance with USEPA standards and have the test results submitted to DPHSS prior to the promulgation of the rules and regulations and within 3 months of the bill's enactment
- Agency supported pointed out challenges with the bill, and added the opinion that this measure seeks to be protective of human and environmental health, and expressed commitment to working with the necessary stakeholders to ensure that we have a measure that is protective, enforceable and economically feasible

UPDATE: Bill 175-37: Act to amend the Toilet Facilities and Sewage Disposal Act codified in 10 GCA Chapter 48 – signed into law July 18, 2024

- Agency issued a joint statement with WERI and GWA expressing concerns over the original bill as introduced, followed by an updated response to support the substituted bill instead of the bill as introduced
- Bill was substituted and further amended on the floor during June session:
 - o Parentally subdivided lots and decedent lots over the groundwater protection zone must be 9,600 ft². and use advanced nitrogen-reducing septic systems
 - o Agency must promulgate rules and regulations within 1 year of law's enactment
 - o Created Northern Guam Lens Aquifer Study fund
 - o Nitrate testing results must now be posted online
 - o Stricter enforcement

PROGRAMS/PROJECTS/PARTNERSHIPS:

Pacific Islands Regional Recycling Initiatives Council Meeting – May 30–31

- PIRRIC is held prior to the Micronesian Islands Forum (MIF)



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- PIRRIC meeting discussed the recycling achievements, issues and the support needed from respective island leaders to promote recycling initiatives in the Pacific
 - Member islands are: Guam, CNMI, Palau, Pohnpei, Nauru, Chuuk, Yap, FSM, Kosrae, and the Republic of the Marshalls

Micronesia Islands Forum: June 3 – 4

- This year's MIF theme was: "Writing Our History, Determining Our Future"
- MIF is a regional intergovernmental organization composed of island nations and territories in the Micronesia sub region of the Pacific
- MIF goals include: sustainable development, climate change, ocean conservation, economic development, cultural preservation and regional security
- Guam's input included:
 - reporting on the island's recycling rate of 38.51%
 - the upcoming community composting and gardening training
 - plastic bag ban enforcement and compliance efforts
 - implementation of the island's Integrated Solid Waste Management Plan

UPDATE: \$560K SWIFR Grant Funded Project – MOA between Guam EPA and Guahan Sustainable Culture CLEARED AG review, routed to Governor for signature – June 13

- The purpose of this award is to enhance Guam's efforts to advance Zero Waste by providing home composting and gardening training to all of Guam's villages. The program is assembled with a robust system of incentives to increase participation and support for technical assistance and data collection. Training and follow-up will be executed by sub award recipient, Guahan Sustainable Culture (GSC), with grant administration by Guam EPA
- GSC will perform the following program activities designed to implement our plans by educating individuals and communities on composting practices for their homes. By diverting food waste from landfills to composting, we can create nutrient-rich soil for gardening projects

Agency Reviewing Missile Defense Agency's Proposed Final Environmental Assessment/Overseas Environmental Assessment for Guam Test Flight – Due July 2

- The Missile Defense Agency (MDA) has released its Proposed Final Environmental Assessment/Overseas Environmental Assessment for DOD's Guam Flight Test at AAFB in support of validating the interoperability of the sensors and interceptor systems for their proposed missile defense system.
- MDA is seeking public comment on the attached document, and comments are due by Tuesday, July 2, 2024. We are expected to send comments.
- MDA proposes deploying and testing missile defense systems which include tracking and flight testing twice a year, beginning 1QFY25 - for 10 years.
- Medium Range Ballistic Missile(s) will be launched from aircraft and land-based assets at AAFB will track these target missiles, and attempt to launch interceptor missiles at them from Northwest Field. The activity is expected to occur on AAFB and outside the US Exclusive Economic Zone outside of Guam.

Guam Public Health Laboratory Working Group Meeting – June 14

- Agency working with GovGuam stakeholders to provide permitting assistance for the CDC-funded lab which seeks to provide confirmatory biosafety level 2 and 3, or BSL-2 and BSL-3, analytical testing capability for clinical human specimen and workforce development



- Agency administrator notes that we will provide technical support for regulatory and permitting needs of the lab

Civil-Military Coordination Council Meeting – June 18

- Agency continues to provide technical support for regulatory and permitting requirements of DOD projects
- Administrator continued to echo the progress and challenges of the agency's role in providing environmental clearances for DOD construction permits

UPDATE: Establishment of Interim Action Levels for Dieldrin Released – As of July 18

- Public hearing featuring US EPA Senior Toxicologist Patrick Wilson was held on June 24 at 3PM at the Guam EPA administration conference room
 - o GWA, Prutehi Litekyan and Guam Daily Post in attendance
- Draft Risk Assessment Document to establish Interim Action Levels for dieldrin issued June 10.
- 45-day public comment period will conclude on August 14

Agency submits comments on the Guam Flight Test Environmental Assessment/Overseas Environmental Assessment – July 29

- Comments were due on August 2 and were submitted to the Community Defense Liaison Office to be compiled with other GovGuam comments for official submission to the Missile Defense Agency's contractor – ManTech

Agency submits comments on Draft Environmental Impact Statement for F-15 Beddown and Infrastructure Upgrades at AAFB – July 29

- Comments were due on July 29 and were submitted to the Community Defense Liaison Office to be compiled with other GovGuam comments for official submission to the USAF Civil Engineer Center

Agency attended kickoff meeting as part of the Aquaculture Advisory Board created by Governor's Executive Order 2024-01:

- Agency participated in the kickoff meeting to determine its role and subcommittee within the board in support of DOAg's Division of Aquaculture

Agency attended kickoff meeting as part of the Attaining Housing Commission created by Governor's Executive Order 2024-02:

- Agency participated the kickoff meeting to determine its role and subcommittee within the commission
- Agency to reexamine the existing environmental rules and regulations to determine effectiveness and necessity in instances where they may impede attaining housing
- Agency will tasked to find ways to mitigate nitrate pollution

AAFB Issued Letter of Deficiency Countersigned w/ Region 9 – August 7:

- AAFB has 45 days to respond to the letter requiring attention include:
 - A sediment control system with run-on and run-off controls at the facility must be addressed in a revised permit renewal application submission.
 - Engineering studies showing the design of operational units and flood protection devices and how these will prevent washout
 - Groundwater Evaluation and Monitoring Plan sufficient to identify and evaluate any actual or suspected groundwater impacts from historical OB/OD activities at the facility and any potential future OD activities at the facility.

Agency Participation in governor's School Opening Readiness Team – August 13:

- SORT comprises all GovGuam agencies to assist GDOE with facilities and maintenance at selected schools preparing for DPHSS sanitary inspections

Chairman Carbullido opened the floor for questions or comments.

Director Hollister inquired as to the foot print of the Dededo property. Administrator Lastimoza advised its 9.75 acres.

Director Hollister also inquired on what makes Guam a disadvantaged community. Administrator Lastimoza advised there are different factors like poverty and social economic status. CAPT. DeGrange chimed in and stated by US law all the territories are considered inherently disadvantaged. Capt. DeGrange stated there are different requirements. The data that was collected from the Census did not capture parts of Guam that are disadvantaged. US law however clearly state that the territories are disadvantaged. US EPA is working to clear this up to make sure we are appropriately recognized in all of the data bases. CAPT. DeGrange added that what happens is Guam cannot apply for certain grant money if we are not considered a disadvantaged community. Because of the data collected from the Census, all of Guam does not appear as a disadvantaged community. Administrator and Director Castro also mentioned there are only three small communities, in Guam, on the entire map that show as a disadvantaged community.



Director Hollister inquired in regards to environmental justice what was discussed at the PIEDM. Administrator Lastimoza advised one of the topics was more funding opportunities for environmental justice and what environmental justice is. Currently, there is a community change grant that is available for the territories at a minimum of \$10Mil to \$20Mil depending on the project. Administrator added the primary application has to be a community based organization and partnered with either another community based organization, educational institution or government agency. Guam EPA is not the main proponent for any of these community change grants but during the EJ visit to Guam they met with UOG, Sea Grant, other community based organizations and non-profit organizations to see if they will be interested in applying. Administrator and CAPT. DeGrange noted that the application process is up till November 18th.

Director Hollister asked for clarification on Bill 175-37 which stated that the agency has one year to create a plan (promulgate the rules and regulations) on how the agency is going to do inspections on these Type 4 systems. Administrator Lastimoza advised that before CAPT. Brian Bearden left the agency, there was a draft plan created that still needs to be fine-tuned. Director Hollister then asked how many units (advanced nitrogen-reducing septic systems) can be constructed above the aquifer due to the man power needed to monitor these systems. Administrator Lastimoza advised that hopefully we can be able to capture data through the permitting process. The agency will use this data on how often to inspect and to ensure that the owners are submitting their receipts as proof of maintaining these Type 4 systems.

Acting Deputy Administrator Nic Lee shared that similar to how the agency tracks the UST's and AST's, the agency will speak to our permitting contractor to build in a module for the type 4 systems and holding tanks that the agency will be permitting. We will have GPS location for every tank that goes through the permitting process and we will be able to determine the timeline for renewal. Acting Deputy stated the priority right now is to get through the administrative process for the rules and regulations. He also added that Johnny Abedania, Acting Chief Engineer, is going to assemble his water pollution control team, at least once a month, to fine tune the regulations. Acting Deputy also stated we have a pretty good framework from CAPT. Brian Bearden so the next step is to draft the economic impact statement (EIS) as part of the Administrative Adjudication Law process for the agency to formally adopt the regulations. In the meantime, the industry has to catch up because no one on Guam is currently offering or has a supply of these nitrogen reducing septic systems. Acting Deputy added that the industry has to make sure that the systems they are providing to the consumers need to meet the NSF245 rating as stipulated in the law.

Director Hollister inquired on who a person calls if they witness an illegal dumping activity. Administrator advised there are 10 government agencies that are able to issue a litter citation like the mayor's offices, GFD, GPD, DPR, DPHSS, Park Rangers, and GEPA to name a few. Director Castro inquired on who is in charge of the litter citations. Glenn San Nicolas advised it is Guam EPA under 10 GCA Chapter 51. Director Castro stated maybe the agency needs to reach out to the 10 agencies to do a refresher training.

Director Castro asked when we are going to have the new building. CAPT. DeGrange advised, once it is awarded and executed they have 6mos to provide the full set of architectural and engineering (A&E) specs. Administrator advised the agency wants to remain involved to ensure that the A&E firm has some experience in designing a lab. CAPT. DeGrange stated our big priority is to build a laboratory that could actually give the agency increased capability to do the testing on island and eliminate spending money to ship samples off-island. We ultimately want to become a regional lab to assist the other territories, become better partners within the region and to give us the capability to do the testing on island, said CAPT. DeGrange.



Administrator Lastimoza updated that GSWA has withdrawn their intention to purchase a tire shredder. In discussion with our Guam EPA Program Manager, Carl Goldstein, he stated the agency is going to need a tire shredder to clear the tires on our Dededo property so the agency is going to move forward with that. Administrator advised a MOU will be created stating GEPA will retain ownership of the shredder but operation will be with either GSWA or DPW. Glenn SN added that Mr. Rubbishman is sending off 120 tons of tires a week to India which is just their inventory. Mr. Rubbishman not only has the monopoly on all the automobile and tire repair facilities, they are also the only tire processing facility on Guam. So if their shredder or sheers go down, it's down for weeks at a time.

Administrator stated the hiccup on this is that we can't build on the property unless we remove the tires on the property so it's either we do it or we don't start construction.

Chairman inquired on the next step for children. Acting Deputy Lee updated that we received four comments (from Prutehi Litekyan, former senator Hope Cristobal, GWA and Senator Sabina Perez). As part of the public process the SDWP has to go through the comments and provide responses. Once completed, it will be posted on the website, and once we determine that we have satisfied those comments the agency will then approach the board for action whether to modify the proposed IAL (Interim Action Level), accept them or reject them. Acting Deputy stated it is going to take some time to go through the comments and referred to the red portion of the table which is pending. Acting Deputy added we don't have a timeframe but it is already in progress. Once this is completed the agency will approach the board to discuss and deliberate whether to adopt the levels or not.

Chairman also inquired if Guam EPA has an attorney to review its documents. Administrator advised not at this time. Acting Deputy Lee stated that Bill 249-37 is out of committee but got set aside in the July session due to deliberation on Bill 175 took unusually longer than a bill would normally take. Now that we are in August all of the session time is devoted to the FY25 budget. Hopefully we will know more in the September Committee and Rules meeting if it will make the next agenda. Acting Deputy Lee added there was no time issues with the legislature in July.

Chairman followed up on the Chief Engineer position has been advertised. Administrator advised it has not and it is still with DOA recruitment section to have it advertised.

Notice of Violations – As discussed on the Administrator's report

(SW-24-006) Issued to Jesse Aguon – July 15, 2024

- Agency Solid Waste Management Program performed a compliance and enforcement inspection at Joaquin Aguon Road, Yona on March 14, 2024 in response to a solid waste complaint on public and private property
- Approximately 30 cubic yards of metals, miscellaneous white goods, and seven junk vehicles were observed
- Compliance order was given to the respondent to clean up within 30 days.
- Follow-up inspection was conducted on June 6, 2024 - SWMP indicated non-compliance with the March 24 orders and observed additional waste was illegally placed at the area of concern.

(SW-24-008) Issued to Mark Shishido – July 29, 2024



- The Agency Solid Waste Management Program performed a compliance evaluation inspection at Reyes Court in Agana Heights on May 14, 2024 in response to a solid waste complaint.
 - Approximately 47 cubic yards of household garbage, metals, plastics and wood
 - Prior to the NOV, the respondent was given 30 days to clean up.
 - Follow-up inspection was conducted on June 8, 2024 - SWMP indicated non-compliance with the May 14 orders and observed waste remained.
- **(SW-24-001) Issued to RDE General Construction – August 7, 2024**
 - Solid Waste Management Program performed a compliance evaluation inspection at RDE in Agana Heights on 01/30/24 in response to a complaint.
 - Junk vehicles, tires, municipal solid waste, metals and litter generated by the respondent were observed on easements and a property owned by GHURA
 - Company and the respondent began cleanup efforts and made progress in those efforts following the issuance of the NOV
 - Incomplete cleanup resulted in the issuance of the NOV
